• What did you enjoy most about your internship?

I enjoyed the variety of the projects that I was given to work on. I was able to watch the projects I worked on go "full circle," which contributed to my understanding of what I was working on. This allowed me to see more of the "big picture."

• What was the most difficult aspect of the internship?

At first, I had difficulties with the terminology that was used because it is very industry specific (healthcare). Eventually, I adjusted to the terminology used, but I am still learning new things about healthcare every day I continue my internship.

Also, when I first started, I was nervous about the possibility of making mistakes. I learned that mistakes are fixable, they allow you to grow and learn, and that it does not do any good to beat yourself up over a mistake.

• How did your experience at UPG and in the Accounting department prepare you for your internship? Since I had completed most of the core classes for my major, I had a firm foundation to stand on when I started my internship.

• How has your internship prepared you for a career?

I have been able to observe and participate in actions that impacted the company. During my time at my internship, the company upgraded to a new version of their accounting system. This came with lots of expected learning curves and technical difficulties. I created and edited Excel upload templates for the new system so that journal entries and invoices could be uploaded in a clean and efficient way.



Companies upgrade to new systems as they feel necessary. I feel that this exposure makes me more prepared for large-scale projects, such as an accounting system upgrade, when I enter the workforce after graduation.

• What recommendations do you have for other students about doing an internship?

When you start your internship, it might be confusing and nerve-racking.
