

Career Academies

679 Participants

The Office of Community Outreach (OCO) hosted five hands-on academies focused on career exploration in the humanities, social sciences, and sciences—led by university professors and industry professionals. The OCO also delivered inperson Career Cluster lessons, helping students connect their interests to future career paths.



Leadership

620 Participants

The OCO expanded leadership experiences emphasize leadership development, setting SMART goals and actionable steps, applying a growth mindset, emotional intelligence, and cultural agility, all supported by a dedicated success mentoring team. This is achieved through 16 programs for pre-college, college, and post-college students.

Launched five programs to boost student engagement and strengthen campus-community connections

Dual Enrollment: University Preview Online

Pitt-Greensburg expanded Dual Enrollment from 22 to 51 students over a 12-month period.

The Dual Enrollment Program provided high school students with the opportunity to earn college credit by taking asynchronous or in-person college-level courses taught by Pitt-Greensburg faculty. Students also participated in College in High School programming, which brought university-level learning directly into their high school classrooms.
