

• How did you find your internship:

Through a listing posted in Courseweb by Dr. Prellwitz in his Public Relations Policy & Practice course during the spring 2020 semester.

What were your duties:

Create and publish content for the organization's social media pages and website. This often including interviewing nurses and families for video content and social media spotlights. I worked a lot on updating the company website and making sure it did everything the organization needed it to. I utilized a variety of different methods to advertise, such as using Google Ads, social media, and even billboards. Much of my focus was to advertise to potential employees.

• How many hours per week were you at your internship site:

Around 10-20 hours per week.

What did you enjoy most about your internship:

The flexibility, and the people who worked at the company. I was treated not like an intern, but as if I were a staff member at the company. The company allowed me a lot of independence and was open to new ideas. I found this really rewarding, as it allowed me to gain a variety of experiences.

• What was the most difficult aspect of the internship:

I was on my own for a lot of the projects I did. I had a coworker who left midway through the summer with no notice, and had to pick up a lot of their tasks. However, I think this experience allowed me to learn how to do tasks I never would have if I continued to work with my former coworker.



I also found it difficult learning about medical procedures the nursing staff and aides who work for Community Care do. I didn't have any background in medical terminology or nursing, but nonetheless found it interesting.

• How did your experience at UPG and the Communication department prepare you for your internship:

I used a lot of what I learned in my classes in both my majors to create advertisements and communicate with office and nursing staff. I also had some great faculty members to turn to and pitch ideas to before I even pitched them to the company, which, as someone who is still learning, is very valuable. I feel that a lot of my professors pushed me to do the best work I can, and I try to bring that to the workplace. Additionally, my experiences with clubs, my work study job at Millstein Library, and as a student leader taught me time management skills, communication skills, and accountability.
