

STUDENTS GAIN A BETTER UNDERSTANDING OF CAREERS THROUGH CAREER ACADEMIES



The Office of Community Outreach at Pitt-Greensburg is forming partnerships with local school districts. Audra Lewis and Erica Samios conducted Career Cluster Academies at Greensburg-Salem Middle School and Jeannette Area High School. The Career Clusters Academies involve students taking an online quiz where they answer questions about themselves and are given up to four career clusters that align with their personalities and interests.

During the last month of the 22-23 school year, 48 students from Jeannette Area High School and 183 students from Greensburg-Salem Middle School participated in these workshops.

Arts/Video/Communications was the most popular career cluster among students. Human Services, Science/Technology/Mathematics were also popular career clusters.

LOCAL STUDENTS GAIN COLLEGE AND CAREER READINESS SKILLS

Greensburg, PA - June 1, 2023

Middle and high school students from Greensburg-Salem Middle School and Jeannette Area High School participated in Career/College Readiness workshops on Pitt-Greensburg's campus. Five faculty members led the workshops designed to target individual career clusters.

Science instructor Christie Orlosky led a Natural Science workshop where students participated in hands-on activities challenging them to use skills to solve scientific problems.

Nursing instructor Amber Bugajski led students in a handsonly CPR course and discussed education requirements and opportunities for registered nurses.

Education Professor Melissa Marks asked students to "draw what education looks like" and evaluate themselves as potential teachers.

Published authors and Creative Writing professors Lori Jakiela and David Newman directed students to draw upon their own experiences through writing pieces.

Associate Professor of Political Science and chairman of the Behavioral Sciences division Paul Adams led a Zoom/in-person workshop discussing employment opportunities in the social sciences.
