

I had developed a website for the Pittsburgh chapter of the Rosary Congresses. Members of the board of the national organization saw this site and asked that the Pittsburgh coordinator connect me to them so I could also help develop the national website.

• What were your duties?

At first I was only updating and maintaining the webiste, but with the COVID-19 crisis I was tasked with converting the organization's main event into a virtual livestream which was both challenging and very rewarding.

How many hours per week were you at your internship site?

My hours varied based on the workload for that week—anywhere from 2 hours in a week to over 40.

What did you enjoy most about your internship?

I most enjoyed getting to see a streaming event through from start to finish. I always found the technical side of live performances to be fascinating and am grateful to have been part of a few through this internship.

What was the most difficult aspect of the internship?

The timing also had to be exactly right, since the final Mass was starting on time whether I had the stream to that point or not.

How did your experience at UPG and in the Information Technology department prepare you for your internship?


